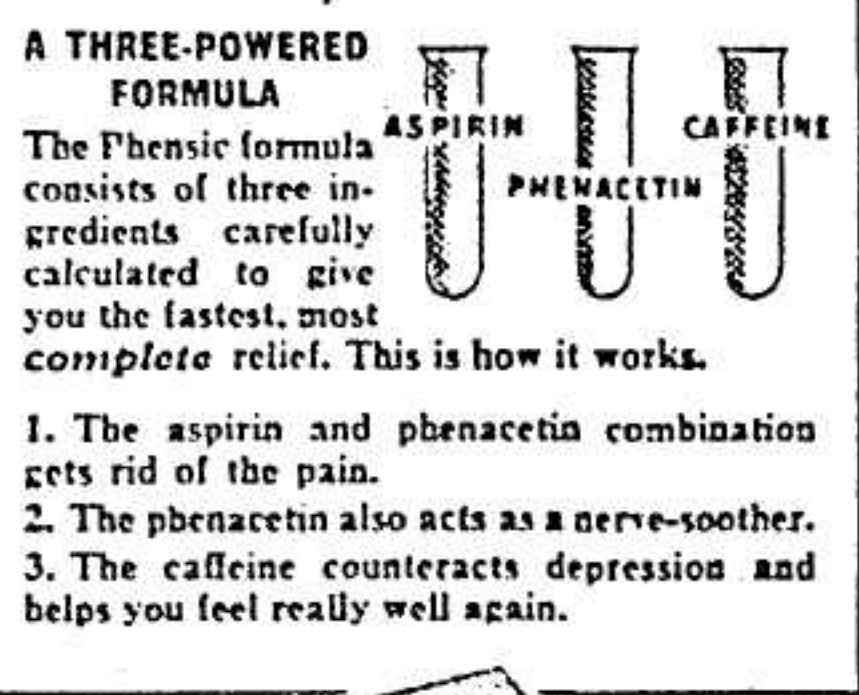

WORLD BANK Ireland Will Attend Next Meeting

IT was announced in Dublin to-day that Ireland will be attending her first meeting of the World Bank in Washington next month. Ireland joined the Bank recently.

The delegation will be led by Dr. Ryan Minister for Finance, who will be accompanied by Mr. T. K. Whitaker, Secretary, Department of Finance, and Mr. J. J. McElligott, Governor of the Central Bank, and a number of officials.

Mr. Duncan Millar, the representative of the Bank, explained at a Press conference in the Department of Finance, to-day that the Bank had made a large number of loans for productive purposes, since it was established eleven years ago. They had been for long and

short terms as the occasion appeared to demand and the rate of interest was governed, as was to be expected, at the rate at which the Bank could borrow.

The Government here, it is understood, has not made an application for a loan to the Bank.

The exact purpose for which the loan may be required would have to be stated and the Bank would be obliged to examine the proposal and, for that purpose, would send certain investigators to this country who would obtain the assistance of the Government in examining any proposed plan. At the conference to-day, Mr. Whitaker said that at the meeting in Washington next month the Irish delegation would find exactly what preliminaries they would have to go through before the Bank would be in a position to send a survey mission.

MORE TROUBLE AT LONDON MARKET

TROUBLE broke out in Covent Garden market, London, to-day—24 hours after the porters returned to work after their five-week-old strike.

About 100 men, employed by ten firms, refused to unload lorries bringing produce into the market, claiming that the drivers were non-union men.

The men were given notice by the firms concerned.

An official of the Transport and General Workers' Union told a reporter that the men had been given their cards and the matter was being considered by the union.

Efforts were being made to prevent the trouble from spreading. A spokesman of one firm said that the stoppage was a continuation of the recent agreement that there should be no victimisation of any kind.

ELIZABETH TAYLOR

Actress Elizabeth Taylor left hospital in New York last night, 19 days after the birth of a daughter, but the baby stayed in hospital. Miss Taylor is the wife of producer Mike Todd.

'Flu Hits Two More Soccer Players

TWO more Sheffield Wednesday players have gone down with influenza, their land-ladies reported to the club to-day.

They are Dave Cargill, first-team left-winger, and Gerald Young, reserve inside-forward. Now nine players are affected, including five recognised first-team players, the other four being Quixall (inside-right), Stanforth (right-back), Curtis (left-back) and Shiner (centre-forward).

Club officials may ask Manchester City for a postponement of the match at Maine Road if any more players go sick.

Rooms Sprayed

All rooms in the Hillsborough stand have been sprayed with disinfectant. Dr. H. Stephen, the club chairman, visited infected players to-day, and Jack Marshall, trainer, checked on players not affected. They have been instructed to keep away from the ground until to-morrow.

It is not yet established whether the influenza is of the Asian type. The infection appears to be only mild.

Scouts Had Colds

British doctors have told Swedish medical authorities that a large number of scouts at the recent world jamboree in England had colds but they did not believe there were any cases of "Asian flu". The Swedish authorities asked the British doctors for information following reports that several Swedish scouts had developed influenza-type colds. These scouts have been asked to report to an official doctor for a virological diagnosis.

In Canada, doctors have diagnosed the ailment of eleven scouts returning home from the jamboree as influenza of an undetermined type.

Tests Awaited

The condition of the 11 boys at the Alderney Isolation Hospital, Poole (Dorset), whose influenza symptoms are puzzling doctors, were stated to-day as comfortable, with no complications. Doctors are now awaiting the results of laboratory and other tests, to establish whether the boys have Asian flu or the ordinary type.

FINED £200

Man Lost Business And Car

PETER GALLAGHER (39), unemployed, giving an address at Castle Avenue, Clontarf, was fined a total of £200 by Justice O'Flynn in the District Court, to-day, on charges of dealing with butter, the importation of which had been prohibited.

The Justice recommended that the penalty be mitigated to a total of £100. In default of payment, he imposed a sentence of six months' imprisonment. Gallagher was also fined £1 on a charge of obstructing two Customs officers in the execution of their duty.

Evidence in the case was heard by the Justice on July 20, when Gallagher was found guilty of being knowingly concerned in June 21 in dealing with 50 lbs. of butter, the importation of which was prohibited, and a second charge of being knowingly concerned in dealing in one cart of butter imported contrary to statute.

On that occasion the Justice intimated that he proposed to inflict penalties of £100 on each charge but adjourned the case until to-day pending negotiations for mitigation of the penalties.

To-day, Mr. Harry O'Connor, defending said the Revenue Commissioners would not consider the question of mitigation until the charges had been imposed. His client had lost his business and his car had been seized. The Justice imposed the penalty of £100 on each charge and added that in view of the defendant's circumstances he would recommend the mitigation stated.

Addition to Irish Fishing Fleet

Latest addition to the fleet of trawlers operating in Rosslare Bay is the 19-foot Rambling Rose, owned by Mr. Michael Doran, of Westford.

Looking Back

Antrim House

ANTRIM House no longer stands in Dublin though at one time it was symbolic of the gay social life of the capital city of Ireland, a social life that had nothing to do with the Irish people but was the preserve of those who supported foreign rule.

Antrim House stood on portion of the site of the present Holmes Street Maternity Hospital. It was the residence of the Marquess of Antrim and was built in or around the year 1778.

In the "Hibernian Magazine" of May 12 of that year, the following account is given of a great reception which was held at Antrim House to celebrate the baptism of Lord Antrim's first child:—

"Yesterday evening the new born daughter of the Earl of Antrim was baptised at his lordship's house in Merriem Square. The Queen, represented by the Countess of Bussingham, was sponsor. Her Excellency went there in state, attended by a troop of horse-drawn coaches, servants on foot, battlesaxes, and all the regalia of Viceroynalty. There was a grand ball and supper given on the occasion, at which there were present most of the nobility and people of fashion in the town. There were twelve tables covered with all the delicacies of the season, and in the middle of the first was a repre-

Condition Of Schools
