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

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# It's a Seanad double for Independent Ken Whitaker

DR. KEN WHITAKER has made history by being picked for the Seanad by two Taoiseachs-and by refusing a Party Whip each time.

In 1977 he was nominated to the Seanad by the then Taoiseach, Mr. Jack Lynch, and did not accept the Fianna Fail whip.

Coalition Taoiseach, Dr. FitzGerald, paid him a tribute yesterday by including him in his eleven and accepting that Dr. Whitaker will be an "Independent voice" in the Seanad.

Dr. Whitaker (65) was born in Rostrevor, Co. Down. Educated at the Christian Brothers' School, Drogheda, he took a M.Sc.(Econ.) at the University of London.

He made his name as an outstanding economic brain when, as Secretary of the Department of Finance, he was involved in planning the industrial boom under Mr. Sean Lemass.

A former Governor of the Central Bank, his views on the state of the economy have always been carefully noted and it is significant that







Re-united with her sister and mother in Dublin last night, Sheila talked of her ordeal.

"We thought we had done everything right. My sister - a doctor in Cork - had written to the Department of Foreign Affairs who said we didn't need visas for our stay. We even showed them photocopies of the reply they had given to her

"But it was no use and despite the fact that I showed them my entrance letter to Mills College in Oaklands, America; they obviously thought I was trying to stay here."

She went on: "It was terrifying being locked in jail and having to wear inmates clothing," she recalled. "The worst aspect of it all was that they would not allow me to contact

"When I was deported to Geneva, I had to buy a return ticket and stay there for four days before being allowed through in Dublin. The whole experience has been a nightmare and one I can never forget."

Said her sister, Dr. Yasmin Khan: "We are not particularly worried anymore about our own' case, but we are upset that this episode could be repeated on people with similar backgrounds. to ourselves."
