NTRIM House no longer stands in Dublin though at one time it was symbolic of the gay social life of the capital oity of Ireland, a social life that had nothing to do with the Irish People but was the preserve of those who supported foreign

Antrim House stood on portion of the site of the present Holles Street Maternity Hospital. It was the residence of the Marquess of Antrim and was built in or around the year 1778.

In the "Hibernian Magazine" of May 12 of that year, the following account is given of a great reception which was held at Antrim House to celebrate the baptism of Lord Antrim's first childi-

"Yesterday evening the new born daughter of the Earl of Antrim was baptised at his lordship's house in Merrion Square. it disappeared altogether. The Queen, represented by the Countess of Buckingham, was sponsor. Her Excellency went there in State, attended by a CAR RENTAL troop of horse-led coaches, servants on foot, battleaxes, and all the regalia of Viceroyalty. There


