#### AIR VICTORIES MANY

Germans Now Claim Over 200,000 Italian Prisoners

#### A SUCCESS NEAR GAZA

Yesterday the French gained fresh ground near the Oise Canal, troops reaching the southern bank of the Ailette along the whole front. Further progress was recorded in the evening, and last night's report stated that no less than 66 enemy aeroplanes had been accounted for during the battle of Malmaison. The latest victory gives the French command of the crest of the Chemin des Dames, round which the battle has raged for six months.

The British repulsed several hostile attacks, also re-taking an advanced post which had been captured by the enemy near the Ypres Roulers

The Germans state that their withdrawal from the Chemin des Dames was "intended for some considerable time," and was carried out without interruption.

While, the Germans report, no actions of importance have occurred on the southern front, they claim to have increased their captures from the Italians to over 200,000 men, with 1,800 guns and large quantitles of other booty.

A German auxiliary cruiser has been sunk in the Kattegat by a British submarine, which subsequently sank 10 German trawlers. The British have captured the first Turkish line in the neighbourhood of
