French Journalist's Version of an Amazing Interview

In a Reuter's message from Paris yesterday Lord French is reported as having made a prophecy to a representative in Dublin of the Paris "Journal" that the Government would subdue the agitators in Ireland, that a period of tranquillity would follow, and then once again trouble would break out.

"I SHALL NOT FAIL"
