BRITISH LABOUR M.P.'S VISIT

To Study Political, Industrial and Social Condition of Ireland STATEMENTS BY DELEGATES

Belfast and Many Southern Centres Included in the Tour

The delegation appointed by the British Parliamentary Labour Party, to study on the spot the present political, industrial, and social conditions of Ireland, will commence their inquiry in Dublin to-day, and will afterwards visit Belfast, Cork, Tipperary, Limerick, Kilkenny, and Ennis.

WANT TO GET EVERY POINT OF VIEW

The vanguard of the delegation arrived in Dublin to-day. Mr. Lindsey, who is in charge of the tour, is accompanied by Mr. Arthur Henderson, M.P., and Mr. J. R. Clynes, M.P., the other two members of the delegation, are expected to reach Kingstown this morning by the mail boat.

MR. HENDERSON'S STATEMENT

Mr. Arthur Henderson, when seen on his arrival by the representatives of the Press, said that he was in Ireland in an official capacity, but was associated with the delegation from the L.A.D. and M. Union and the Dublin Trades Council which visited Ireland from time to time during the last few years.
