Drombane village Hall, six miles from Thurles, was attacked by armed men. A conflict lasting four or five hours followed, in which an attempt was made to blow up the building. The besieged called for aid by firing rockets, and at last were relieved. A sergeant and constable were captured on patrol and tied to a fence. Later they were released.

At Cork Quarter Sessions yesterday the Recorder reserved judgment in the claim of Constable Michael Walsh for £1,000 for having been maliciously injured at Berrings on Sunday, the 28th September last. At Macroom Patrick Carmody, Millstreet, was awarded £300 for injury to a motor-car on the occasion of the bold-up and robbery of bank officials last November.

Two women students were yesterday admitted to the Irish Bar. For comments on the Sandbills murder mystery the Editor of the "Empire News," Manchester, was fined £500, and the proprietors another £500 with costs.

John Leen was arrested and remanded, charged with having attempted to murder Serjeant Sullivan, K.C. The prisoner declined to recognise the court. In Clare a labourer was fired at and wounded, and an attempt was
