Irish Troops Home from India. A cadre of the 1st Garrison Battalion, R.I.F., arrived at Plymouth on Saturday afternoon, bound for Belfast. It consists of 33 officers and 500 men in charge of Lieut-Col. Jackson. They were at Camporee since 1917, and although there were no fets, there have been a number of strikes, during which military demonstrations have taken place. On the homeward voyage on Christmas Day Pte. Moore fell overboard and was drowned.

By the collapse of a ferro-concrete girder 24 ft. in Birmingham the day were killed. A man named Dolan was buried in the debris, the 13 minutes before the day were killed. Slump in Irish Bankruptcies. Concluding the business of the Belfast Bankruptcy Court Judge Matheson observed he was sorry there was not more business at the court but if the cause was plenty of money and good business it was a subject for congratulation, and the courts not wish the business to return. The business had fallen everywhere else, even in Dublin and Cork.

ROSCOMMON AMBUSH SCENE. Charged at Strokestown with unlawful assembly on Jan. 14, when it was alleged he, with others attempted to drive Mrs. Walpole's stock of the lands of Clonon, Roscommon, Jas. Hanley was sentenced to two months' imprisonment. Evidence was given that Mr. W. J. Walpole, his son, a sergeant and two police were ambushed on the lands, and about 12.30 a.m. a number of men entered from the public road. Mr. Walpole and his son fired two or three shots and the crowd fled. Const. Cahill and Geo. Walpole pursued and captured Hanley, when searched, had three notices on him calling upon Mr. Walpole to give up the lands. Mr. W. J. Walpole said he fired only one shot in the air; he could not account for how many his son fired. Mr. P. J. Hanley, the accused, said Roscommon was particularly free from crime, and it was regrettable that Mr. Walpole and his son fired on these men who were only following a social custom of exercising a right of the land.
