Any man guided by God's law must regret retaliation and crime. It would be unjust to tax a whole people, habitually peaceful, with the acts of a few irresponsible hot-heads, probably emissaries of secret societies.

Four men forced their way into the hall, covering Mr. McSwiney with revolvers. Shots were exchanged. One of the raiders was badly wounded and carried off by his fellows. Mr. McSwiney was shot in both arms, and is in the Mercy Home in a serious condition.

An official story of the shooting of a Dublin signalman near Drumcondra describes it as a daring attempt to seize rifles that were in the train. A lance-corporal was wounded and is in hospital. None of the soldiers fired shots. A young man named John Heaphy is in hospital in Limerick
