O'Connor declared that the main purpose of the Bill was to continue the coercion of Ireland, and said this attempt to snuggle through a Coercion Act for Ireland was one of the worst instances of departmental hypocrisy and pharasaism he had seen in his life. He warned the Government that this kind of policy would not put down crime in Ireland, but would increase it.

Mr. Devlin said that there were more police murdered in the riots of 1886 than since the Sinn Fein movement started, and he protested against this continued policy of trying to place the stigma of criminality upon a race free from crime, simply because of disorder, which was largely, if not entirely, due to the Gevernment policy in Ireland.
