ARMY MOTOR VAN HELD UP.

DARING ESCAPE.

SEARCH FOR MR. BARTON SAID TO BE CAUSE.

SCENE LIKE A WILD WEST "PICTURE STUNT."

One of the most daring of the political escapades yet reported took place yesterday in mid-day on a busy Dublin thoroughfare at the junction of Blessington St. and Berkeley St., the direct highway between the centre of the city and Glasnevin, Phibsborough and the Phoenix Park.

Completely Surprised.

Immediately the van stood it was surrounded by men with revolvers and "Hands up" was ordered.

The military party were taken completely by surprise, being, in fact, obliged to obey, and the raiders searched the vehicle, but it is stated, found nothing.

Full Speed Ahead.

RESTRICTIONS ON SHIPMENTS OF CATTLE.

A CRITICAL SITUATION.

The Mersey Port and Docks Board have made arrangements for closing the Birkenhead and Liverpool docks on Saturdays to midnight on Sundays.

This order accentuates the serious inconvenience anticipated as a result of the Order of the Food Ministry prohibiting the landing of Irish cattle at British ports on Sundays.

Shippers have, however, decided to adopt a system of shipping fat stock on Saturdays and on Sundays.

The Dublin Port and Docks Board passed a resolution strongly protesting against the action of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, as prejudicial to the interests of Dublin port and to the Irish cattle industry.

Mr. Barry, who proposed the resolution, said that he had been informed by the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board that the Board had decided to close the docks on Saturdays and Sundays.
