

AN AMAZING EPISODE IN DUBLIN CITY.

ARMY MOTOR VAN HELD UP.

DARING ESCAPE

SEARCH FOR MR. BARTON SAID TO BE CAUSE.

SCENE LIKE A WILD WEST "PICTURE STUNT."

One of the most daring of the political escapades yet reported took place yesterday in mid-day on a busy Dublin thoroughfare at the junction of Blessington St. and Berkeley St., the direct highway between the centre of the city and Glasnevin, Phibsborough and the Phoenix Park.

Shortly after 1 o'clock a military motor wagon containing a driver, two military officers and soldiers, coming from Ship St. Barracks, where Mr. Barton, M.P., was tried by court martial in the forenoon, was held up at the corner of Nelson St. by a handcart, on which was a long ladder which stretched across the middle road.

Completely Surprised. Immediately the van stood it was surrounded by men with revolvers and "Hands up" was ordered.

The military party were taken completely by surprise, being, in fact, obliged to obey, and the raiders searched the vehicle, but it is stated, found nothing.

When the circumstances looked out it was generally believed that the raiders were in the direction of Mountjoy, but Mr. Barton, but in this they were disappointed although the van was actually a military motor wagon.

Full Speed Ahead. Orders were ordered officers and soldiers in the van, instructing the driver to get away at full speed.

Two Officers and One Man—All Unarmed. The incident, which was reported in an official statement, was as follows:—

At 1.15 p.m. an ordinary Ford car proceeded up Blessington street.

The car contained two officers who were in the general court martial which tried Mr. R. C. Barton, M.P., in the early part of the day, a private, and a military prisoner, all being unarmed.

At this point a revolver shot went off, so far as I could learn, it could have been fired from the foot-way outside Dr. Redmond's house, about 20 or 25 yards away.
