## Irish Week

What has come to be known as Irish Week—the week on which St. Patrick's Day falls—is still a month ahead, but it is not a bit too early to begin preparations for making it a more notable occasion this year than on any former occasion. A full meeting of the Council of the Dublin Industrial Association discussed the matter last week and made an appeal that evidently deserves a genuinely practical response in all parts of the country.

The meeting directed the prompt attention of manufacturers, merchants and the general public to the question, and expressed the hope that a widespread effort will be made all over Ireland to push the sale of Irish goods during Irish Week, which will begin on the 15th and end on the 20th of next month. Local bodies throughout the country are recommended to take the matter up in good time and approach shopkeepers with a view to arranging for widow exhibits of Irish-made goods. These displays have been found to have the effect of stimulating interest in native products and familiarizing the public with established manufactures and easily introducing new wares. Hence the great importance of organizing such exhibits every year on an extensive and comprehensive scale as possible. It is suggested, too, that at a time like the present, when the needs of the country demand increased production, local conferences might be arranged to consider the resources of each district, and to decide whether means could be conveniently adopted to meet these needs.

## WOMAN SHOT DEAD

## IN RAID FOR ARMS

Ellen Morris, aged 49, of Glenlister, Ballyagh, Cox-Westford, was shot dead in her bungalow on Saturday night by one of six masked men who raided her house for arms. Her husband, daughter and cousin were present. She had taken up a pistol to force the raiders out of the house when one of them pointed a revolver and shot her through the heart.

While the poor woman lay dead in the kitchen the man who had committed the crime and his complices remained in the house, and, with a callousness that seems hard to understand, actually set about the work of making a search for arms. They visited two rooms on the right-hand side of the kitchen, but failed to find the only weapon which Mr. Morris possessed—an old rifle and a shotgun.

## LIMERICK MAN FIRED AT

About 8 o'clock on Saturday afternoon Mr. James Dalton, an employee of the Limerick Gas Works, was shot at while proceeding to his residence in Clare street. On his way home he had to pass along The Mall, opposite Barrington's Hospital. He was apparently engaged reading a newspaper, and had just reached a point known as Howlett's Lane, when four revolver shots rang out, one passing under Mr. Dalton's arm, a second over his shoulder, and a third over his head. The fourth struck the middle finger of the right hand, fracturing it. Two men were observed in a lane-way, who took to flight. Mr. Dalton is pursuit, and made their escape.
