Inasmuch as the new Bill is based or the principle of Home Rule, and would deprive us of our equal citizenship in the Parliament of the United Kingdom, this Council cannot recommend the Parliamen tary representatives of Ulster to accept any responsibility for it; but innamed as the Bill is in substitution for the Go vernment of Ireland Act, 1914, and it re cognises the right of six counties of Ulster to separate treatment (for which Ulster has so tomeciously striven), and offers : preferable alternative to the Act of 1914. and inasmuch as there is no prospect of procuring the simple repeal of that Act. this Council is of the opinion that the Ulster representatives should not assume the responsibility of attempting to defeat the Bill, but should press for such amend ments of the Bill as are necessary and desirable in the interests of Ulster, and of the Unionists throughout the South and West of Ireland in the event of the
