THE QUINION DICK ESTATE.

There is much jubilation among the tenants of the Quinion Dick Estate in the parish of Dunmore over the success of their efforts to become tenants of the grazing lands on the estate. These lands are at present occupied by a few large graziers, and some three months ago the tenants of the estate, nearly all of them having only small holdings, came together with the object of endeavouring to obtain for themselves the grazing of these extensive meadows, nearly 1,000 acres in area, and with a moderate rental of £1,100. Canon Macken, Parish Priest of Dunmore, immediately joined the tenants in preparing a memorial to the landlord, and the agent on the estate, Mr Denis Kirwan, of Dalgin, forwarded the memorial with a letter recommending very strongly that the request of the memorialists should be granted. A favourable reply was received a fortnight since, and a few days ago the tenants, Mr Kirwan and Canon Macken met in Dunmore to arrange the details of the new grazing tenancy. At the close of the very pleasant proceedings, Mr Silke, one of the tenants, on behalf of all the tenants proposed a cordial vote of thanks to Mr Kirwan which was passed with acclamation. He pointed out what a valuable thing it was for those struggling tenants, some 80 in number, to have the right of grazing this large tract of land, and he said that if our public men had the earnestness and desire to accede to the just claims of the people which were shown by Mr Kirwan in these negotiations the burning questions at present agitating the country would soon be settled.

THE TULLY PATENT GAS PLANT.

An up-to-date and excellent invention in the Gas world has just been made and patented by a clever Irishman whose family were for generations connected with this county. Mr Cornelius Dominick Tully is eldest son of the late Thomas Dominick Tully, Esq., the able manager of the London Gas Light Co., one of the largest gas lighting concerns in the world. Mr C. D. Tully was for many years the popular manager of the Sligo Gas Company and as such carried out many successful improvements leading to efficiency and economy and when he left it for a better post in London he brought the Company to a remarkable degree of solvency and efficiency. The value of the invention made by Mr Tully is seen in the following extract:—"A method of carbonising and gasifying which makes the minimum of demand on external heating. Carbonising and Water-Gas Process combined in the same apparatus, a continuous vertical gas retort so elaborated as to allow of the burning of a small proportion of the Coke to CO2 during the blowing operation with air, using the external temperature of the retort and afterwards for heating the regenerators. Air and Steam would both be heated regeneratively, and during the run the super-heated steam would gasify coke while the hot gas resulting would carry up the retort the heat necessary for carbonising the descending charge of coal. By this method a thermal efficiency on gasification of 75 per cent. to 80 per cent. would probably be obtained."
