# Over 100 Police Barracks Attacked: Extraordinary Situation

## DOUBLE SWOOP

Sensational Attacks on Government Buildings

### Police Barracks and Income Tax Departments Gutted

The week-end witnessed a variation of the recent sensational happenings in Ireland.

Late on Saturday night and during the early hours of yesterday morning organised attacks, daringly conceived and practically perfectly executed, were made on all the important income tax collecting centres in the country, and with a few exceptions the objectives were all destroyed by fire.

Armed men suddenly confronted the caretakers or occupants of the various premises, held them up with revolvers, and proceeded with their work of destroying all documents connected with the

As an example of the thorough manner in which the affair was carried out, it is roughly estimated that in Galway alone the consequential damage is £300,000, and that the collection will be paralysed for months to come.

#### Barracks Destroyed

Almost simultaneously an all-Ireland swoop was made upon barracks, most of which were recently vacated, the majority being burned to the ground.

Unwards of 100 altogether were attacked, and, according to the Press Association, sixty were destroyed.

It is stated that the total damage is estimated at £100,000, and that malicious injury claims to that amount will be lodged,
