SHOT BY A NEGRO.

Maurice Murphy, brother of Mr. Joe Murphy, National Teacher, Kilsarcon, of Eamon Murphy who is well known in football circles in Kerry, and of Sean Murphy, Jones Rd., Dublin, has died n the City Hospital, Indianapolis, as a result of a bullet wound inflicted on him

The deceased was a sergeant in the Indianapolis police and gained for himself through his bravery, efficiency, and conscientiousness a high reputation in the land of his adoption. The papers of the city all bear testimony to the popularity of the deceased. Father J. F McShane, who attended him in his last moments, states in a lengthy letter to the press that the end was characteristic of brave Maurice Murphy.

INQUEST ON DUBLIN VICTIMS.

50 ROUNDS FIRED.

Further evidence for the military was given on Tuesday at the resumed inquest on Michael Cullen and Ellen Hendrick. shot lead near Portobello Bridge, Dublin, on the night of March 22.
