COAL & TAXES—IRISH COMMERCE HAMPERED

Presiding to-day at the statutory meeting of the Dublin Chamber of Commerce, Mr. J. Good, President, dealt with a number of subjects that had been engaging their attention, including the Government of Ireland Bill, the reports of the sub-committees, together with the recommendations of the committee on the subject of the present time at the prospect of further taxation. It was with surprise, therefore, that the business men learned that not only was the tax to be continued, but that it was to be increased by 50 per cent.

The Coal Controller had agreed to give Ireland an additional 40,000 tons a month from South Wales

The Irish imports for the year had been as follows:—January, £25,315 tons; February, 306,300; March, 441,436; April, 350,663. This showed a shortage to the end of April of over 350,000 tons. This coal

—Belfast and Northern area, 739,719 tons; Dublin and Midland area, 355,720; Cork and Southern area, 252,492.

shortage was due to the absence of shipping, and the Shipping Controller informed them early in March that he had allowed fourteen additional ships especially in addition to the vessels ordinarily engaged in the carrying of the coal supplies from South Wales to Ireland.

As these ships or supplies were not forthcoming, they communicated with the Shipping Controller, without obtaining any satisfaction.

The Irish Coal Controller, Mr. Morris, had informed them by letter that only two of the seven vessels allocated to Dublin had come into the port. They sent a copy of this letter to the Shipping Controller and endeavoured to get him to fulfil his undertaking, but without success.

The Chief Secretary for Ireland (Sir H. Greenwood) had been interesting himself

in the matter, but the only additional information he had obtained was that the priority of loading for the Tunisian Kingdom still continued, but they feared, however that priority, like the special allocation of shipping, was more honorary in the branch, as merchants had informed them that their goods would not be refused
