Kilmallock is the scene of the latest tragedy. Two policemen are dead and several wounded, one gravely. It is rumoured that at least one of the attacking party was killed. The deaths followed a five hours' attack on the R.I.C. barracks. Eventually the building was burned down. The remains of a sergeant and constable were found in the ruins. The district was cut off for bours, and the wires were still down at the time of writing. Most of the defenders were wounded. In one case, Dr. Dundon of Cork was brought down for an operation.

The recent find of four hundred pounds in gold near Dublin had a sensational sequel on Thursday night, when the Irish Volunteers made a number of arrests. Between ten and 11 o'clock the village was surrounded, and two men were arrested in one house, and two further arrests were made on the road. A motor car conveyed the prisoners to an unknown destination.

Private Clarkson, King's Own Regiment, a native of Wigan, has succumbed in Dublin to a bullet wound, supposed to have been accidentally received while on duty near the Viceregal Lodge. · The secondary teachers' strike in Limerick has been settled.
