LABOUR CONGRESS IN CORK.

The deputation appointed at Tuesday's meeting in Cork were received yesterday by Mr Lloyd George, who was accompanied by the Chief Secretary and other Coulition leaders. Two hours' conversation on the intolerable Irish position followed, in which the Dominion solution was pressed on the Government According to the news agencies the deputation say that they were heard with patience, courtesy and apparent sympathy. They felt very satisfied with their interview, and could say no more pending the issue of the agreed report, which should be available on Thursday.

It was indicated that it was quite possible there might be further conversations, though none had been arranged. In the Lobby great importance appears to have been attached to the deputation
