

LORD MAYOR UNABLE TO SPEAK.

NOW IN EXTREMIS IN BRIXTON JAIL.
SIGNS OF THE END DEATH BED MESSAGE TO IRISH PEOPLE.

WORLD'S INDIGNATION
Every indication regarding the Lord Mayor of Cork pointed last night to imminent death and the probability that life was merely a matter of hours, while he might succumb at any moment.

DEMANDS FOR RELEASE MANY ISSUED IN BRITAIN
Many further appeals are being made in Britain for the release of the Lord Mayor of Cork. Amongst them are the following—

ON VERGE OF DEATH HANDS AND FEET NUMB
The Lord Mayor of Cork is on the verge of death, says our special representative at Brixton. The last message from the prison at 9 o'clock last night was that his hands and arms were becoming numb, the blood circulation extremely sluggish, and the feet cold.

PROTESTS FROM AMERICA
Mr. A. Griffith received the following telegram yesterday, signed Rosa Downing, president, and Margaret Broomhan, from Washington—

LORD MAYOR'S AGONY
The "Irish Times" London correspondent writes in an article of August 29th: "I doubt whether the Government really mean to let Mr. MacSwiney die."

DUNDALK MEETING SCENE
A meeting of Co. Dublin magistrates yesterday requested, and advised the Government to release the Lord Mayor immediately—in the best interests of humanity, civilization and peace between Ireland and Great Britain, this request being forwarded to Mr. Lloyd George and Sir H. Greenwood.

LADY MAYOR'S HEROISM
There was an atmosphere of gloom over the whole of Brixton when she came to the neighbourhood of her cell, and when it became known that she was dying, a solemn silence, which stood out in marked contrast to the demonstration and respect of everyone, took possession of the place.

STILL BRINGING IN FOOD.
The prison authorities still continue to bring food to the bedside of the dying man, a system described by one of his sisters as the refinement of cruelty.

THE FRENCH PRESS

DR. FOGARTY'S FOREWELL
Most Rev. Dr. Fogarty, before his departure for Ireland last night, addressed the following letter to Father Dominic, Chaplain to the Lord Mayor of Cork—

CALLS ON M. MILLERAND TO INTERVENE
Paris newspapers, all of which publish the memorial of Mr. G. Gavan Duffy, M.P., on behalf of Lord Mayor MacSwiney, treat the matter most sympathetically, and they clearly and definitely indicate their desire that the prisoner should be released at once.

BY SACRIFICING HIMSELF
His house was raided by British police, and he was sentenced to two years' imprisonment in spite of the fact that he had never committed any crime—outside the crime of opposing the British cause in Ireland.

DEATH HOUSE BESIEGED
A widespread series of raids for arms during the week-end was marked by exciting incidents in Meath and Galway.

WITHOUT FIRING A SHOT THE COUP AT BALLYCASTLE
The captures made by the raiders on Ballycastle (Co. Antrim) police barracks included rifles, ammunition, hand-grenades, and a few bombs.

MAIL TRAINS HELD UP
The mail train from Kilrush to Ennals was held up on Saturday evening at Clonsilla Bank. One man stood on the Bank and told the passengers to keep in their seats.

THE LONGFORD TRAGEDY
A pathetic scene after battle. Only 37 jurors attended for the inquest at Longford military barracks on the body of Const. Mullen (24), who was shot near Ballynabuck on Friday.

THE MILITARY ABSENT
Inquest on COBH ex-soldier. "Death from shock caused by bullet and bayonet wounds inflicted by Cameron Highlanders. As there was no evidence of provocation there was no justification for the man's death."

PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE
All over the country masses are being celebrated, prayers recited, and protests made against the treatment of the Lord Mayor of Cork. Meetings have been held in all the Limerick churches.

MOTION REFUSED.
The chairman persisting in his refusal to accept the motion stated that it would embarrass the Government.

GENERAL RAID FOR ARMS

Patrick Lynch was unlawfully brought from his home on the night of August 20th, then stationed in Hospital, and taken about 200 yards to the south side and there brutally murdered by the said military.
