The distinguished Archbishop of the West has already called for it. We have respectfully supported his appeal, and we do so again.

The position in Ireland is a very perilous one, and all men of sanity would like to see it ended. When a man of the great position of the Archbishop of Tuam makes a suggestion we think that it is eminently worthy of consideration.

We cannot afford to be fighting always in Ireland.

We want to see an end to the present disastrous and devastating war.

This is the anniversary of Parnell's death.

Parnell fought for a united Ireland and that fight was his glory.

Every effort that he made was directed to the larger achievement; and at this moment we should surely not neglect the principles which he advocated.

Some time ago we reviewed in these columns a book written by Mr. Desmond Ryan on the life-work of P. H. Pearse. In that book Mr. Ryan pointed out that at the time of the introduction of the Birrell Bill Pearse was strongly in favour of it. That was Parnell's policy—to take everything we could get from the English Government and then to look for more.

Pearse, like Parnell, had a true appreciation of the future. The future is with us if only we can use the instruments which are placed in our hands, so that we may endeavour to work out the National Destiny.

Anniversary.

Wednesday was the 29th anniversary of the death of Charles Stewart Parnell. A large and beautiful wreath of laurel and moss was placed on the Parnell monument in O'Connell St., Dublin, by the Anniversary Association, and, despite the inclemency of the weather, numerous old followers of the dead Irish leader and other visitors placed floral tributes on his grave in Glasnevin.

Priest's Advice To People.

Very Rev Canon O'Connor, preaching at Listowel, advised his people to be cool and patient. He hoped no irresponsible person would do anything which might cause the town to be turned into a shambles like Ballybrigan, Mallow and Trim.

Mr J. McCormack's Great Send Off.

Mr John McCormack, the famous Irish tenor, left Sydney yesterday, his baggage received by the "Westminster Gazette," and will arrive in London on Nov. 27. He has a great send-off.

The Parish Hall at Leam, 7 miles from Listowel, has been destroyed by fire.

Password Given by the Raiders.

Police Surprised in Schull.

Arms & Ammunition Taken.

Schull police barracks was captured and burned to the ground on Monday evening by armed men who gained admittance by giving the password "Kilmallock" to the constable on guard.

The raiders got away with all the rifles, revolvers, and ammunition in the barracks, as well as a Lewis gun.

At 8 p.m., when the raiders arrived in motor cars, there were six policemen in the barracks and five others in the town. Sergt. Langan and those inside had no option but to surrender when the raiders had gained admittance. Meanwhile the other policemen had also been taken prisoners in the village. The raiders then allowed their captives to remove all their personal belongings from the barracks.

The Haul.—Castle Official

According to a Castle official the capture included 13 rifles and carbines, 11 revolvers, 1,300 rounds of rifle ammunition, 250 rounds of revolver ammunition, 60 bombs and grenades, and 13 shot-guns. The latter had been seized locally.

Court-martial Result

2 North Kerry men Sentenced.

Edmund Wolfe and Patk Whelan, of Finuge, County Kerry, were tried by a District Court-martial held at Limerick on 24th September, 1920, for offences against Reg. 9 A.A. D.R.R. The evidence showed that when a military patrol was entering Finuge on the night of the 20th September they heard a whistle sound twice. Going down a lane they encountered the accused.

Wolfe had the stock of a gun in his hand and 19 rounds of sporting ammunition in his pocket. The barrel of the gun was found in a hedge. Whelan had one round of sporting ammunition in his possession.

The accused, who refused to recognise the Court, were found guilty and sentenced to be imprisoned with hard labour for one year.

Mr Lloyd George, in an interview with Mr H. Spender, for the new Georgian "Liberal Magazine," ridicules the Dominion Home Rule proposals, and says such a plan could not be carried by the Independent Liberals even if they had a majority. He also insists on Ireland's right to bear her share of war taxation.

Soldiers' Disarmed.

Coup in Offaly.

Eight or ten of the Shropshire Light Infantry were held up by armed men near Ferbane, and relieved them of their rifles, ammunition, and the mails for the camp.

Military Raids in Dublin.

Early on Tuesday morning the military raided several houses in Dublin.

ON THE IRISH FRONT.

Casualties in Recent Attacks on Police Barracks.

The "Irish Bulletin" gives a detailed account of the attacks on police barracks from Oct. 31, 1919, to Sept. 26, 1920, from which it appears that 58 were attacked. Of these 12 were captured, 2 destroyed during the conflict, and 44 resisted and efforts to storm them.

The casualties in these attacks were:—

In the 12 barracks captured 81 police were taken prisoners. These were disarmed and released without injury. Seven men alleged to have taken part in the attacks were captured; they were tried by courts martial and sentenced to long terms of penal servitude.

In the recent examinations in the National University, Cork, Edmond Gerald Joseph Courneane, son of Mr Michael Courneane, Basin View, Tralee, obtained first-class honours in his third medical examination. Master Courneane is a youth of great promise. In his short career he has gained many distinctions and deserves hearty congratulations on his latest achievement. He received his early education in the Christian Brothers' Schools, Tralee.

Tralee Pig Fair.

There were 1,120 pigs and 500 bonhams in market. Prices for the former ranged from £11 to £11 10s per cwt., and for the latter from £5 to £8 each.

"Black and Tan Government." The London correspondent of the "Irish Independent" says—An M.P. on Wednesday aptly described the Lloyd George Ministry as "The Black and Tan Government." That is a nick-name which will stick.
