Both are believed to be natives of Arau Islands. It is stated that Laurence Mac-Donogh was shot dead whitst trying to get through the outposts on the hills beyond Kilronan. Michael Mannister was shot in the chest, the bullet piercing the He died subsequently from his wounds.

A third man, Michael Peliy, also a mative of Aran Island, received a slight wound during the shooting.

Folan oscaped by jumping over a cliff, and no trace of him could afterwards be found.
