WHEN the people of Killeagh gathered at a commemoration ceremony to pay tribute to the first Fenian to die in East Cork. Tim Daly of Midleton, they were urged by the speaker Mr. Peadar O Maidin, County Librarian, to document the history of the area's connection with the Fenian movement. The man commemorated, Tim Daly, fell fighting for his country's freedom in Castlemartyr on the night of March 6. 1867, at the age of 34.

Some other place, perhaps, and some other time, we shall learn what it was in Fenjanism and what it was the Irish character that brought them so close together.

it may well be that the mere an Irish Republic was sufficient to stir the imagination and the hearts of our predecessors. It may well be that they realised that they had a cultural distinctiveness, completely distinct and independent from those who would be their masters. It may well be that the benians realised that they were neople of a subject race and that tney faced up to their circumstances as best they could, both here at home in Ireland and aoroad. It may well be that Fenianism took the Irish people as they were, didn't want to change them, but merely offer them the opportunity of freedom. It may well be that without freedom iney could be nothing. It is to be regretted that our professional historians have not thought fit so far, to investigate the causes of Fenianism, but whatever the historians of the future may find, of one thing we can be certain and that is of the simple faith that these men had in their cause.

"They believed their cause to be a holy and just one and they fought that cause with extraordinary courage. Now, as tonight we remember Tim Daly and his comrades, let us try to bring to our minds the qualities of these men. Fortunately, our own great writer, Canon Sheehan, has left us an imperishable picture of the true nature of men like Tim Daly and Peter O'Neill-Crowley and John Mc-Clure and all the other names that come down to us, like the words of the old, never-to-beforgotten song.

"Canon Sheehan had closely observed the Fenians as a young boy. Standing there on the terrace of St. Colman's College on that very cold March evening, he had seen the dark masses of men swaying over the bridge at Fermoy, carrying the body of Peter O'Neill-Crowley from Mitchelstown, all the way until they laid their sacred burden down there by the sea, under the shadow of Ballymacoda Church. He stopped and ran about 15 to 20 yards and I saw him fall to the ground, I was very much alarm ed and ran away as far as I could, I have identified Edmond O'Loughlin as being in the party. I saw a young man there called Sullivan. saw Constable Sheedy lying dead, The place where the shooting took place is recorded as being named Green's Gate. It is just at the eastern end of Midleton town.

"The insurgents marched onto Castlemartyr and before they came to the town, they met there the men from Castlemartyr, Then they marched short-circuited the town and came in at Killeagh, or eastern end of Castlemartyr. There were about 400 of them at this time and they moved in a body towards the police barracks. The barracks at the time was in a premises now used as Abernethy's Garage and if you look at that building, you will see that the two gables, the easttern and western gables project a few feet from the roofs of the other houses and away up in both gabies there are windows, small windows cut veritable loop holes, which could command a full view of the street.

"Part of the plan of the campaign was to start huge fires, so that the police would be decoyed out of their barracks. We have a record of two of these in the locality, one of them on the Ladysbridge road at a farm of a man called Wallace Walker. We are told that the police shut themselves into the barracks at Castlemartyr and didn't come out, but the police statement says that they marched to Walker's farm and then came back again to the bar-

"However it was sometime during the night, about two o'clock in the morning, Timmy Daly called on the police in the barracks to surrender. There were five or six policemen altogether inside the barracks.

"Now again I suppose the best thing I can do is to read for you the police evidence, Police Constable J. A. McConnell, who was in charge; of the police in the barracks. The door was violently rapped. After the third time, I fired and ordered my men to fire. There was fire from the outside also. We kept firing. Insurgents retreated. We pursued, but they had cover at the bridge and I thought it safer not to follow. About thirty yards from the barrack we found the body of an insurgent, which I removed to the day room. Inquest on the eighth of March, identified as Timothy Daly of Midleton.
